**#1**  
**Miller Center**  
*Opening Change*  
*Sunshine Rain*

The first stop on the art tour of the St. Cloud State campus is “Opening Change” found in the University Library within the Miller Center. As you enter the University Library look up to the atrium above the third floor to see Kenneth F. von Roenn Jr.’s 2001 artwork “Opening Change” in the window.

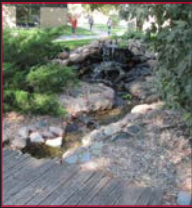


Next you’ll head up to the second floor of the University Library and walk through the study tables to see SunshineRain a 17-foot tall yarn sculpture created by Merle Sykora, a former St. Cloud State University Art professor.



**#2**  
**World Commons Garden**

The next stop on the St. Cloud State University Art tour is the World Commons Garden. Head out of the Miller Center and pass between the Administrative Services and Performing Arts Center buildings to locate the World Commons Garden located between Administrative Services and Centennial Hall. The garden was designed in 1997 by Kinji Akagawa.



**#3**  
**Husky Plaza – Cascade – Granite River**

Head toward Atwood Memorial Center and turn left to view “Cascade” by Richard Hansen, the Husky Plaza bronze sculpture by Chris Bennett, and “Granite River” by Anita Montag ’96 located on the Plaza between the Performing Arts and Atwood Memorial Center.



**#4**  
**Atwood Memorial Center Theatre Lounge Mural**

Enter Atwood Memorial Center and look to the floor to see Common Strands, an in-floor mural celebrating culture and the Mississippi River. Next head to Atwood Theatre Lounge to see murals honoring the university’s past, present and future.



**#5**  
**Odin**  
 Kiehle Visual Arts Center

Now head out of Atwood Memorial Center and head toward Kiehle Visual Arts Center where you will find “Odin” by Roger Schwitalla on the outside entry of the building.



**#6**  
**Infinite Voices**  
 Find Janet Lofquist’s *Infinite Voices* on the lawn near Lawrence Hall’s west entrance. *Infinite Voices* consists of a granite base on either side of the main sidewalk, each partially covered with a stainless steel panel bent like a loosely unfolded map.



**#7**  
**History Wall Display**  
 Stewart Hall, 702 1st Ave S

Now head toward Stewart Hall and up to the second floor hallway toward Room 214 to view a student-created history wall.



**#8**  
**Perspectives**

Now head out the front of Stewart Hall to the shining steel statue on the lawn. “Perspectives” was built by Charles Huntington in 1990 as a centerpiece on campus.



**#9**  
**Riverview – Historic Classroom**

Now head over to Riverview Hall to see a 1911 restored historic classroom in Room 113 from the university’s past.



**#10**  
**Eastman Hall**  
*Ripples / Renewal / History / Assemblage*

Now head next door to Eastman Hall to view artwork by Stacia Fink Goodman ‘89 honoring the Mississippi River, a history plaque celebrating the history of the building, and an original student art piece by Bigyan Lama Thing ‘19.



**#11**  
**Halenbeck Hall**

Next head around Shoemaker Hall and across the foot bridge to Halenbeck Hall. Enter in through the first door to see the center court of the former Eastman Hall gym. Turn and go down the stairs in Halenbeck and down the hall to visit the Hall of Champions.



**#12**  
**Wick Science Building Wildlife Display**

Your final stop on the tour will be the native wildlife display in the Robert H. Wick Science Building first floor hallway.



Set outside classroom 101, a series of cases include a fantastic display of native wildlife.
